

Beaded Scarf Free Pattern



Pattern Description:

This easy crochet scarf pattern features a fun and flirty design, highlighted by bead stitches that provide a unique pop of texture.

Crafted with a solid color yarn, the scarf maintains a classic and simplistic aesthetic, balancing its playful texture. It is a beautiful and standout accessory for any wardrobe.

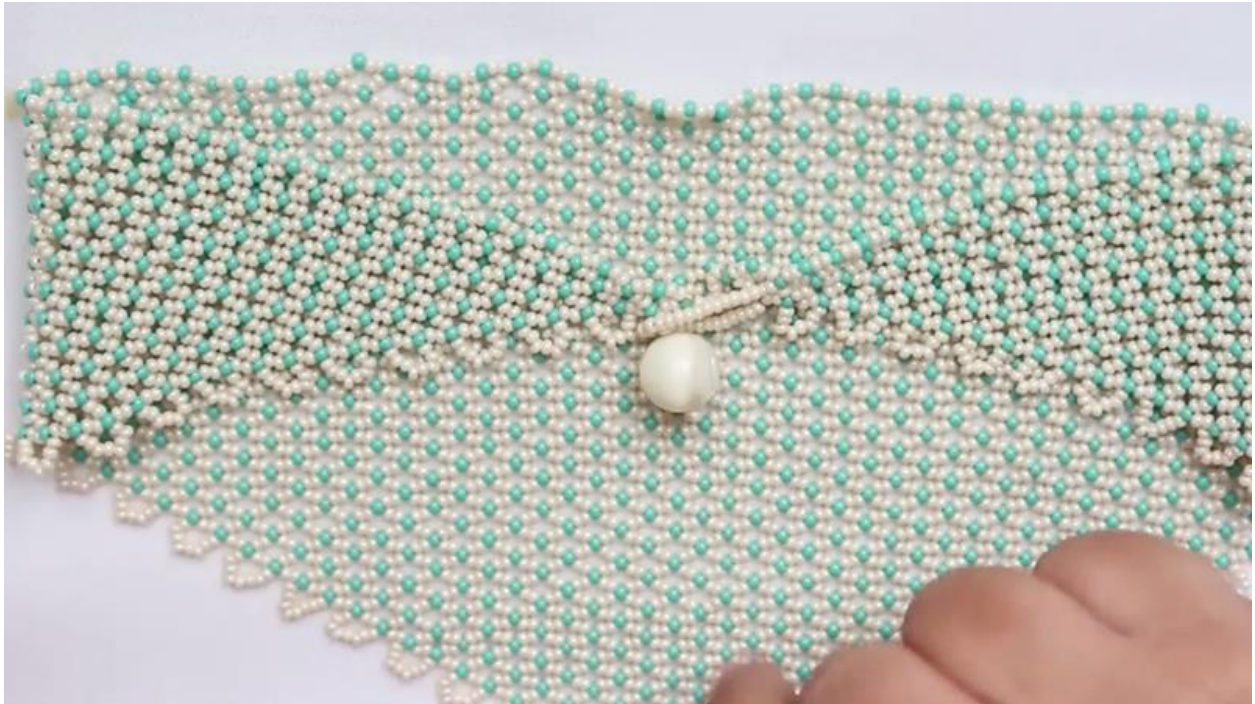
Materials Needed & Measurements:

- **Yarn:** Red Heart Soft in Leaf
- **Yarn Weight:** Size 4 Yarn, approximately 325 yards (including fringe)
- **Hook:** US J/ 6.0 mm Crochet Hook
- **Notions:** Yarn Needle, Scissors
- **Measurements:** 6 ¼" x 61" (not including fringe)

Stitches & Abbreviations Used:

- (ch) chain
- (fdc) foundation double crochet
- (dc) double crochet

Instructions for Making the Beaded Scarf Pattern:



Foundation Row

- Begin by creating a **slip knot** on your hook.
- Work **fdt (foundation double crochet)** until your row measures approximately **6 ¼ inches wide**. This creates a flexible base for the scarf while keeping edges neat and stretchable.
 - Tip: If you prefer, you may start with a standard **ch** (chain) of the required length plus 3 turning chs, then work **dc** (double crochet) across.

Row 1: Establishing the Base

- Ch 3 (counts as first dc).
- Work **1 dc** into each stitch across the row.
- Turn your work at the end.
 - This row sets up the foundation for adding texture in the following rows.

Row 2: Introducing Bead Stitches

- Ch 3 (counts as first dc).
- Bead Stitch: Yarn over, insert hook around the post of the previous dc, pull up a loop. Repeat this 3 more times (you should have multiple loops on hook). Yarn over and pull through all loops except one, then yarn over again and pull through last 2 loops.
- Work a **dc** into the next stitch.

- Alternate bead stitch and **dc** across the row.
- End with a dc in the last stitch. Turn.

Row 3: Solid Row of Double Crochet

- Ch 3 (counts as first dc).
- Dc in each stitch across the row, working into both the top of bead stitches and the dc stitches.
- Turn.
 - This alternating pattern balances texture and prevents the scarf from curling.

Row 4 and Beyond: Building the Pattern

- Continue alternating **Row 2 (bead row)** and **Row 3 (dc row)** until your scarf measures approximately **61 inches long** (or desired length).
 - Tip: For a more playful look, make the scarf longer; for a neck wrap style, stop shorter.

Adding Fringe

- Cut multiple strands of yarn, each about **10-12 inches long**.
- Gather 3-4 strands together. Fold in half.
- Insert hook into the bottom edge of scarf, pull folded loop through, and draw ends through the loop to secure.
- Repeat evenly across both ends of the scarf. Trim to even out the fringe.

Finishing Touches

- Weave in all loose ends with a yarn needle.
- Gently block scarf if desired-pin it to shape and lightly mist with water to help set stitches.
- Enjoy your new beaded scarf!

Now, you'll have a scarf that measures **6 ¼" wide x 61" long** (excluding fringe), with a unique beaded texture and classic drape. Perfect as a statement piece or everyday accessory.
