Simple Crochet Flower Patterns



Pattern Description:

This simple crochet flower features **four petals**, designed to be adaptable and easy to work up. Despite most flowers having an odd number of petals, this almost square design is favored for its versatility.

Materials Needed & Measurements:

- Yarn: Double knit yarn in 2 colours
- Yarn Weight: Double knit.
- Hook: A 4 mm crochet hook (US G/6 UK 8) is required.
- Notions: A yarn needle is needed for working away yarn ends.
- Measurements:
 - Yarn for center: less than 2 m / 2.2 yards.
 - Yarn for petals: about 7 m / 7.5 yards.

Stitches & Abbreviations Used:


- **Ch** Chain
- **Dc** Double crochet
- **Dc inc** Double crochet increase (2 dc in the same st)

- **Hdc** Half-double crochet
- Hdc inc Half-double crochet increase (2 hdc in the same st)
- SI st Slip Stitch

Instructions for Making the Simple Crochet Flower Patterns:

The flower is worked in four rounds, starting with the center color and then switching to the petal color.


Round 1: The Center



Begin this round with the color designated for your flower's center.

- Start with a magic ring.
- Chain 1 (ch 1). This ch 1 does not count as a stitch but is there to bring you to the required height.
- Make 8 half-double crochets (hdc) into the magic ring.
- **Join to the first hdc** with a slip stitch (sl st), ignoring the initial ch 1.
- At the end of Round 1, you should have 8 hdc.


Round 2: Expanding the Center



Continue with the center color for this round.

- Chain 1 (ch 1). Again, this ch 1 does not count as a stitch.
- Make a half-double crochet increase (hdc inc) in each of the 8 stitches around. This means working 2 hdc into each stitch.
- Join to the first hdc with a slip stitch (sl st).
- Fasten off your yarn and work away your ends.
- At the end of Round 2, you should have **16 hdc**.

Round 3: Forming the Petals (Part 1)



For Round 3, you will introduce the color for your petals.

- Change to the petal color.
- **Join this new yarn** by pulling up a loop in the stitch directly after the slip stitch join of the previous round.
- Chain 2 (ch 2). These ch 2 stitches will not count as a stitch throughout this round.
- Begin the repeating sequence: Make 3 double crochets (dc) in the next stitch, slip stitch (sl st) in the next 2 stitches, make 3 double crochets (dc) in the next stitch..
- Repeat from to 2 more times. This creates the first three petals.
- After the repeats, make 3 double crochets (dc) in the next stitch and then slip stitch (sl st) in the last 2 stitches.
- Finally, make 3 double crochets (dc) in the stitch that already contains the initial ch-2 from the start of the round.
- Join to the first dc with a slip stitch (sl st).
- At the end of Round 3, you should have **24 dc**, not including the chain stitches and slip stitches.

Round 4: Shaping the Petals (Part 2)



This round further defines the petals using the petal color.

- Chain 2 (ch 2). These ch 2 stitches will not count as a stitch.
- Make a **double crochet increase (dc inc)** in the same stitch where you chained.
- Make a double crochet increase (dc inc) in the next 2 stitches.
- Slip stitch (sl st) in the next stitch, which will be the last stitch of the current petal.
- **Skip the next stitch**, which is the slip stitch between petals from the previous round.
- Begin the repeating sequence: Slip stitch (sl st) in the first stitch of the next petal, double
 crochet increase (dc inc) in the next 5 stitches, slip stitch (sl st) in the last stitch of the petal,
 skip the slip stitch (sl st) between petals..
- Repeat from to 2 more times.
- After the repeats, slip stitch (sl st) in the first stitch of the last petal.
- Make a double crochet increase (dc inc) in the next 2 stitches.
- Join to the first dc with a slip stitch (sl st).
- Fasten off your yarn and work away your ends.
- At the end of Round 4, you should have **40 dc**, not including the chain stitches and slip stitches.

Weave in all ends securely, and your charming four-petal crochet flower is ready to brighten any project!
